

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George Gerswhin(1898 – 1937), born Jacob Gershvin, and his older brother Ira were born to Russian Jewish immigrant parents in Brooklyn, New York. In his teens he showed more promise on the piano than Ira, for whom the family's piano had been bought. In 1914, he secured a job demonstrating new songs for a Tin Pan Alley music publisher. He soon began writing songs and in 1919, he wrote his first musical comedy "Sinbad" in which Al Jolson performed the immensely popular "Swanee". There were many musicals and film scores to follow, often in collaboration with Ira, an immensely clever wordsmith. Then he discovered Jazz. "Rhapsody in Blue" was commissioned as a piano and jazz ensemble piece by bandleader Paul Whiteman in 1924, the title suggested by Ira after a painting by Whistler. Gershwin & Whiteman were determined to bring respectability to jazz music then referred to as "degrading, pathological, nerve-irritating, sex-exciting music" (New York American, 1922). It was so successful that a piano concerto was commissioned, followed by "An American in Paris", and the opera "Porgy & Bess" in 1935. This was criticised by black audiences as they felt the depiction of the black community was condescending and stereotypical, but it was the first American opera to be performed at La Scala in Milan, and has been immortalised in film. Other operas, orchestral pieces and piano preludes were written between 1923 and 1936. He died in 1937 during surgery for a brain tumour.

Ben Oakland: (1907 – 1979). An American composer, lyricist and pianist active from the 1920's to 1940's. A child prodigy, he first performed at Carnegie Hall at the age of nine. He composed for Broadway, vaudeville and wrote several film scores. During WWII he performed in USO camp shows and was awarded 14 citations for his contribution to the war effort.

Morgan Lewis: (1906 – 1968) After graduating from Michigan University, Lewis worked as a composer and choreographer. He collaborated with Nancy Hamilton to write 3 Broadway shows, "One for the money" (1939), "Two for the show" (1940) and "Three to make ready" (1946).

Hoagy Carmichael: (1899 – 1981). Born in Bloomington, Indiana, he originally studied law there. He met jazz musician Bix Biederbecke at university, who recorded his first composition "Riverboat Shuffle" in 1924. He is well known for his songs "Georgia on my Mind", "Heart and Soul", and "In the cool, cool, cool of the evening".

Irving Berlin: (1888 – 1989). Born in Russia as Israel Baline, the son of a Russian Jewish cantor, he immigrated to New York with his family when he was 15. He worked as a street singer and singing waiter, and then began writing songs. He became well known when he wrote the popular piece "Alexander's Ragtime Band" for Tin Pan Alley in 1911. His musical output includes 1500 songs, scores for 19 Broadway shows and 18 films.

Manning Sherwin: (1902 – 1974). Born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, he settled in Britain in 1938. He had a long career in musical theatre on the West End and in film.

Rhonda's family have always enjoyed singing together, and in local choirs. She has been a chorister with the Latrobe Chorale, the Yallourn Madrigal Singers, the Mozart Occasional Choir, and for the last 6 years, the Melbourne Chamber Choir. Rhonda was Musical Director of the Yallourn Madrigal Singers from 1996 for 8 years, enjoying performing at many local events and competing with success at eisteddfods. She was founding Musical Director of the Glengarry Primary School Choir in 2000, and founding co-Musical Director of the Coal Valley Male Chorus in 2006. Rhonda was a member of the early music quintet, Le Voce Essenziali, performing regularly at local events and with the Early Music Society of Victoria. She studied voice with the late Barbara McNeil, Alexander Technique with Carol Veldhoven and attended the inspiring ACCET Summer Schools for Choral Conductors for many years. Rhonda has enjoyed working with the West Gippsland Chorale.

Accompanist, Simon Loveless

Simon has been active in choral music for many years, variously as conductor, accompanist, singer, administrator and advocate. Currently he is Musical Director of the Da Capo Singers and Casey Choir, accompanist & tutor to Berwick Youth Choir, accompanist to the West Gippsland Chorale, and a state committee member of the Australian National Choral Association. In the past he has sung with Melbourne Chamber Choir and Gloriana, toured the UK and China with (respectively) the Australian Welsh Male Choir and Cranbourne Chorale, and worked on a number of theatrical productions, including the world premiere productions of 1975: A Populist Opera and Love, Death, Music and Plants.
